Santiago Ballerini (Almaviva) is recognized in the Americas as one of the leading tenors in Bel Canto repertoire. Respected and celebrated by his colleagues, directors and theaters around the world, Ballerini hails from Buenos Aires, Argentina, and has sung in all major opera houses in South and North America. Ballerini covered the roles of Don Ottavio in Mozart's "Don Giovanni" and Count Almaviva in Rossini's "Il Barbiere di Siviglia" at the Metropolitan Opera in New York City in season 2016- 2017. He also returns this season to the Teatro Colon in Buenos Aires as il Tenor Italiano in "Der RosenKavalier" from Strauss and As Ramiro on Rossini's Cenerentola. This past season, Ballerini made his United States debut at the Caramoor Festival in New York as Fernand in "La Favorite" to rave reviews. He returned to Caramoor in July to sing Gualtiero in Bellini's "Il Pirata." He also sang the role of Tybalt with The Atlanta Opera in its production of "Romeo et Juliette" in 2016, and returns this season to debut Tonio from Donizetti's La Fille du Regiment. In January of 2016, Ballerini was awarded the Grand Prize at the "Laguna Magica" international Vocal Competition in Chile, receiving invitations to sing Cassio in Otello with Teatro Artgentino and to sing with Tenerife Opera. Before starting his professional singing career, Ballerini was a pianist for nine years, and also studied Music Therapy at the Universidad de Buenos Aires, specializing in addiction treatment.

Meechot Marrero (Rosina)

Puerto Rican soprano Meechot Marrero, hailed by El Nuevo Día as, "a revelation...a young Puerto Rican star with a great career ahead" is a recent master's degree recipient of the Yale School of Music, and after being awarded the American-Berlin Scholarship from the Opera Foundation, joined the Deutsche Oper Berlin ensemble for the 2016/17 season. At Deutsche Oper Berlin, Ms. Marrero will perform the roles of Frasquita in Carmen, Giannetta in L'Elisir d'Amore, Papagena in Die Zauberflöte, Belinda in Purcell's Dido and Aeneas and Bianca and Gabriela in La Rondine. She performed at Savannah Voice Festival in 2016 as Juliette in Roméo et Juliette. Ms. Marrero began her musical studies with the San Juan Children's Choir, and, after completing a Bachelor of Science in molecular biology at the University of Puerto Rico, received further training from the Puerto Rico Music Conservatory and Yale Opera at the Yale School of Music.

Marco Nisticò (Bartolo)

Italian born baritone Marco Nisticò's impressive combination of beautiful tone, exquisite artistry, and superior stagecraft has delighted audiences throughout North America, South America, and Europe. Praised as a performer of "gravitas, unforced eloquence, and refined vocalism" by the *Classical Review,* Marco Nisticò has become a widely sought-after singing actor for both comedic and dramatic roles. Last season, he sang Tonio in *Pagliacci* with Opera Memphis, Amonasro in *Aïda* with Opera Colorado, and returned to Sarasota Opera in the same role in addition to appearing with Florida Grand Opera as Malatesta in *Don Pasquale.* In 2014-15, Mr. Nistico was reengaged by Sarasota Opera to sing Tonio in Leoncavallo's *I pagliacci* and Posa in Verdi's *Don Carlos*, and sang Dulcamara with Eugene Opera. He returned again to the roster of the Metropolitan Opera in the 2013-2014 season for the premiere of Nico Muhly's *Two Boys*, sang Dulcamara in *L'elisir d'amore* and Dancaïro in *Carmen* with Teatro dell' Opera in Rome, and returned to Sarasota Opera as Figaro in *II barbiere di Siviglia.* The 2012-13 season included his return to the Metropolitan Opera as Dancaïre in *Carmen*, the title role of *Rigoletto* with Sarasota Opera, and Montfort in Verdi's *Les vêpres siciliennes* in a

return to the Caramoor Festival. The 2016-2017 season includes Dr. Bartolo in *II barbiere di Siviglia* with Opera Memphis, the title character in *Don Pasquale* and Manfredo in *L'amore di tre re* with Sarasota Opera, and El Tiempo in *Los Elementos* with New York City Opera. Future seasons include Germont in *La Traviata* with Sarasota Opera, Ping in *Turandot* with San Diego Opera, Ford in *Falstaff* with Opera Colorado, and an appearance with The Dallas Opera.

Jorge Parodi (Conductor)

Reviewed as having "the most expressive conducting hands since Stokowski's", Jorge Parodi has conducted at the Teatro Colón and Buenos Aires Lirica, Volgograd Opera, The Banff Centre, Opera in Williamsburg, and the Castleton Festival, where he was assistant conductor to Maestro Lorin Maazel. Maestro Parodi is the Artistic Director of Opera Hispánica, and the Music Director of the Senior Opera Theater at Manhattan School, where he has conducted all its productions to critical acclaim. Mr. Parodi is also a faculty member at The Juilliard School, MSM Summer Voice Festival, International Vocal Arts Institute, NYU and V.O.I.C.Experience, a vocal workshop under the direction of Sherrill Milnes.

Scott Russell (Basilio), bass, is from Roanoke, Va. and currently lives in New York City. Scott is enjoying a career ranging from opera and music theater to oratorio and church music at home and abroad. He is the recipient of many awards including the NYC district and regional winner of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. Some recent credits include: Gianni Schicchi (Simone) with the Savannah Music Feststival; La bohème (Colline) with Savannah Philharmonic and V.O.I.C. Experience, Don Giovanni (Il Commendatore), Schwabacher Summer Concerts, and 2 Grand Finale concerts with Merola Opera program of San Francisco Opera; Mother of us all (Daniel Webster), La boheme (Colline), Die Zauberföte (Sprecher) with Manhattan School of Music; La Péricole (cover of Don Andrès, Vice-Roi) with New York City Opera; world premiere of Jack and the Beanstalk (The Giant) with Nevada Opera, the world premiere of Quartet (Bear) at Carnegie Hall with RTB, Don Giovanni (Masetto) with Nevada Opera, Susannah (Rev. Olin Blitch) with the International Vocal Arts Institute in Israel and Virginia, Oliver! (Bill Sykes) with Utah Festival Opera and MT, and the musical revue It's a Grand Night for Singing ("Leading Man") with Washington D.C. Savoyards. Mr. Russell is a regular soloist at churches up and down the east coast.

Joachim Schamberger (Stage Director) works internationally as a Stage Director and Virtual Theater Designer. He has worked throughout the United States, Germany, Italy, France, Brazil, Norway, Israel, Japan and China. Productions include *Die Zauberflöte*, *Don Giovanni Così fan tutte*, *Idomeneo*, *La Finta Giardiniera*, *La Bohème*, *Tosca*, *La Rondine*, *Suor Angelica*, and *Gianni Schicchi*, *Aida*, *La Traviata*, *Rigoletto*, *Falstaff*, *The Flying Dutchman*, *Das Rheingold*, *Carmen*, *Faust*, *Lucia di Lammermoor*, *Ariadne auf Naxos*, *Martha*, *Amahl and the night visitors*, *The Rake's Progress*, *Albert Herring*, *Die Fledermaus*, *Sweeney Todd*, *The Wizard of Oz* as well as several modern operas. In addition to directing, he is a Visiting Professor of Opera at DePauw University and works frequently at music festivals and conservatories throughout the world. A graduate of the Musikhochschule in Würzburg, and the Merola Opera Program of the San Francisco Opera, Mr. Schamberger studied digital film production and 3-D animation at the New York Film Academy. James Wright (Figaro)
